Over the course of the last four months, global consultations have gathered the views of thousands of young people – from across all regions – to update the 'Youth Declaration on Food Systems Transformation' which was presented at the 2021 UNFSS. A process to capture global and regional youth priorities ahead of UNFSS+4 has been coordinated by a Youth Task Force – which has mobilized youth through online surveys and consultations hosted by the World Food Forum Youth Assembly and the SENA Youth representatives in collaboration with the UN Major Group for Children and Youth (MGCY).

A pivotal point in this process was a Preparatory Youth Conference that took place in Bangkok where more than 100 changemakers, including alumni of the Hub's Youth Leadership Programme, from more than 50 counties, gathered to consult a 'UNFSS+4 Youth Declaration on Food Systems'. The UNFSS+4 Youth Declaration will be presented at this event, including a call to action from youth for more inclusive, participatory and rights-based decision making in food systems.



In addition to the creation of the UNFSS+4 Youth Declaration on Food Systems, youth have actively participated in the 5 Regional Preparatory Meetings, positively influencing and enriching regional processes on the road to Addis Ababa. The vital contributions of these youth, from organizations, networks, constituencies and Indigenous Communities to these processes highlights their unwavering commitment to be a driving force for a more sustainable, just, and food secure future.

- 4. What commitments or support do you believe are most critical from governments, institutions, or other stakeholders to strengthen youth participation in the ongoing UNFSS pathways?
- 5. Which of the priorities identified in the Youth Declaration resonate most with you and host can we ensure that we move from commitments to change following UNFSS+4?

- 1. How has your country's initiatives or food systems transformation pathways integrated youth priorities, and what has been the impact so far?
- 2. How has the YLP program elevated your engagement in food systems transformation in your country? How does a collaboration with youth organizations such as the WFF National Chapters help to amplify these efforts?
- 3. What role have national food systems hubs or multi-stakeholder platforms played in supporting meaningful youth engagement and leadership?



- 4. Can you share specific success stories or lessons learned from youth-focused interventions or programs supported through country-led initiatives?
- 5. What strategies are needed to ensure that youth priorities remain central in national implementation plans, especially as we move from dialogue to action and accountability?
