Overall session summary, conclusions and recommended actions (max 250 words)

- Inclusive, collaboratively shaped and context-specific policies are essential. Denmark's
 Green Tripartite Agreement was highlighted as a model for co-designing solutions with
 agriculture, environmental, and industry stakeholders.
- Sweden's innovation ecosystem, supported by government and academia, was showcased through Biotech Heights, where Tetra Pak contributes to food innovation and product development. Meanwhile in Japan, the government launched the Green Strategy for Sustainable Food Systems which is supported by Ajinomoto and shows the government's long-term ambition.
- There is a **need to scale innovation and investment**, especially in the **Global South**, by building on existing public-private efforts and ensuring solutions are provided for SMEs too, and tailored to local contexts.
- Business actors emphasized their role as core contributors to food systems transformation, alongside governments, farmers, civil society, and youth, especially when it comes to co-designing policy.
- A call was made to align around a few key outcomes, such as farmer livelihoods, nutrition, climate, nature, soil health and water, to converge investments and policy support.
- The issue is not a lack of finance, but rather the need to mobilize existing resources (e.g., climate finance, agricultural subsidies) toward food systems outcomes.
- Collaboration across sectors and geographies is critical. The FSS+4 community was recognized as a platform to foster this collective action.
